Not only do ALICE families struggle to achieve a good quality of life, **their struggle also has a huge impact on our regional economy.**

Due to low wages, limited work hours, and a lack of savings, ALICE lives on the edge financially, struggling to meet basic needs and unable to save for the future, let alone weather a financial setback, such as an unexpected medical bill or car repair. These are families who work hard to provide for their families but often slip through the cracks because they aren't eligible for poverty-level support, but also don't earn enough to truly get by, let alone thrive.

HOW DOES UNITED WAY HELP?

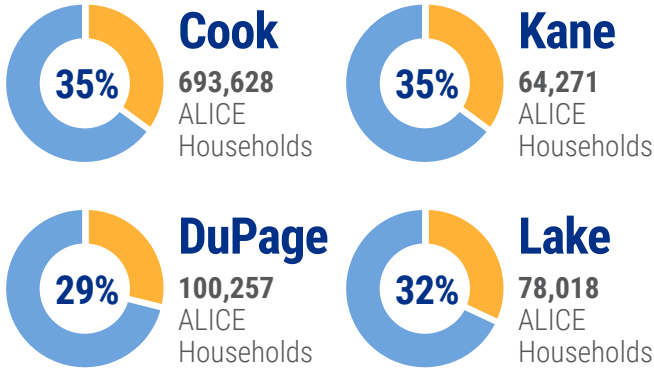

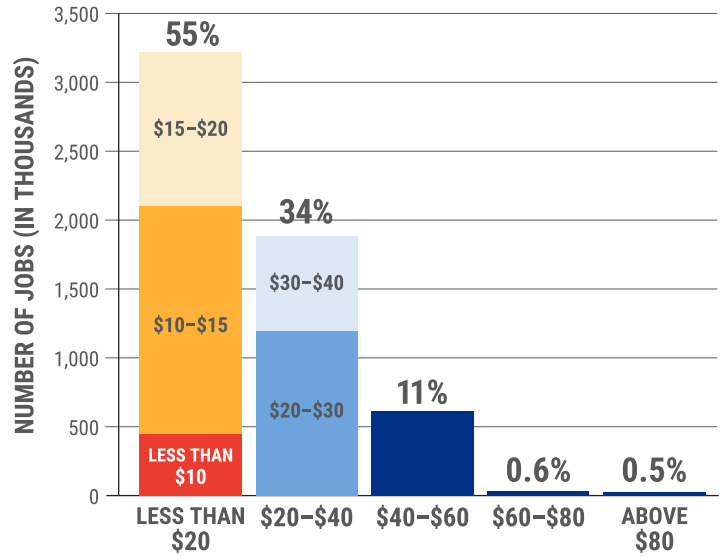
ALICE* By-the-numbers
